

The Trial of the Three Marias in Lisbon, Portugal



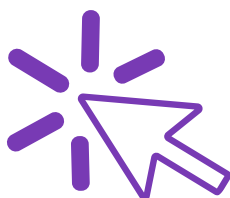
October 25, 1973

In 1973, the “Three Marias” were charged by Portugal’s authoritarian Estado Novo regime with immorality for their feminist book *New Portuguese Letters*.

The trial of Maria Isabel Barreno, Maria Teresa Horta, and Maria Velho da Costa, known as the "Three Marias," began on October 25, 1973. Their book, *New Portuguese Letters* (*Novas Cartas Portuguesas*), published in 1972, was deemed pornographic and immoral by the Estado Novo regime, leading to their prosecution. The book, a feminist critique of patriarchal society, explored women’s sexuality and gender roles, sparking international attention and highlighting censorship and gender oppression in Portugal.

Significance: This court case became a symbol of resistance against authoritarianism and patriarchal control, contributing to feminist discourse in Portugal and beyond.
